SECTION ONE

Outdoors & Nature

Roseville sits on 78 miles of creeks. Most residents have never walked them.

01 Miner's Ravine Trail

FREE · PAVED · 8.5 MI END-TO-END · DOGS OK ON LEASH

Roseville's signature greenway. The paved trail follows Dry Creek and Miner's Ravine from Sierra College Boulevard all the way to downtown, passing through tree-lined parks, suburban neighborhoods, and Olympus Pointe Sculpture Park. You can enter and exit at dozens of points, so it doesn't need to be a full ride or run — pick a two-mile chunk and go.

INSIDER TIP Park in the small lot behind the Home Depot on N. Sunrise for a less-crowded entry. Coyotes and deer are common at dusk. Don't go after dark unless you have lights — riders have ended up in the creek.

02 Maidu Regional Park

FREE · 152 ACRES · TRAILS, PLAYGROUND, MUSEUM

The biggest park in town and the most underused. There's a 2.5-mile walking and biking loop, native grinding stones visible right off the trail, a kids' playground, soccer fields, and the Maidu Museum and Historic Site tucked in the back. Bring a picnic and stay all afternoon.

INSIDER TIP The grinding stones — depressions ground into the bedrock by Nisenan Maidu women over centuries — are easy to miss. They're near the small interpretive area behind the museum. Bring kids and let them find them.

03 Olympus Pointe Sculpture Park

FREE · OPEN-AIR ART · TRAIL-ACCESSIBLE

A free, drive-by-it-every-week outdoor sculpture park sitting between Miner's Ravine Trail and the office park behind Sunrise. The most famous piece is "Cosmos" — the tall red sculpture you've definitely seen if you've driven Eureka. Stop, walk through, take a few photos. Ten minutes well spent.

04 Harry Crabb Park

FREE · QUIET · WALKING, BASKETBALL, TENNIS

Tucked next to Morgan Creek Golf Club, this is the park locals send their kids to when Maidu is packed. Paved and dirt trails, basketball and tennis courts, playground, soccer fields. Surprisingly empty most weekdays. A favorite for families and walkers who want a quiet, flat loop.

05 Pleasant Grove Creek Trail to Blue Oaks

FREE · 2.5 MI · PAVED · STROLLER-FRIENDLY

Roseville's west-side answer to Miner's Ravine. Gentle, family-friendly, and shaded in summer. A solid morning walk or after-dinner stroll. Connects neighborhoods you might not otherwise see.

06 The Dry Creek Footbridge

FREE · QUICK STOP · OFF FOLSOM ROAD TRAILHEAD

From the Folsom Road trailhead, it's about 3/4 mile of paved path to a wooden footbridge that crosses the confluence of Antelope Creek and Miner's Ravine Creek — the technical "headwaters" of Dry Creek. Quiet, shaded, perfect short walk. Often empty.

07 Mahany Park

FREE · WALKING TRAIL · LIBRARY + FARMERS MARKET ON-SITE

A small but mighty park with a paved walking loop, the Mahany Library, a community center, and a year-round Sunday farmers market (9am–1pm). Stack a walk + market run + library trip in one visit.

08 Folsom Lake — Beal's Point

\$12 VEHICLE ENTRY · BEACH, SWIM, KAYAK · 25 MIN FROM ROSEVILLE

The closest real beach to Roseville. Sandy shore, clear water, picnic tables under oaks. Beal's Point Trail also kicks off here — an easy 3.1 mile walk along the shoreline. Bring a paddleboard if you have one; rentals are available nearby in Granite Bay.

INSIDER TIP Arrive before 9am on summer weekends or you'll fight for parking. The park fills up by 10:30 on hot Saturdays. The Roseville Public Library loans out free California State Park day passes — check with any branch before you pay for a day-use fee.

09 Granite Bay Connector Trail

FREE · MTB · INTERMEDIATE · ROCKY SINGLETRACK

For mountain bikers who don't want to drive an hour. Rocky, technical sections with real singletrack, plus lake views as a reward. Closest legit MTB trail to Roseville.

10 Lake Natoma

FREE SHORE ACCESS · KAYAK/SUP RENTALS NEARBY · 20 MIN AWAY

Folsom Lake's smaller, calmer sibling. No motorized boats means glassy water perfect for kayaking and stand-up paddleboarding. Rowing teams practice here. Walk or bike the 12-mile loop trail around it.

11 Royer Park

FREE · DOWNTOWN · PLAYGROUND, PICNIC, SLEDDING HILL

Roseville's oldest park, right next to downtown. Massive oak trees, a playground that's actually shaded in summer, and a grass hill that turns into a sledding spot the rare time we get snow. Connects to the Miner's Ravine Trail.

12 Secret Ravine Open Space

FREE · DIRT TRAIL · LESS DEVELOPED

Less polished than Miner's Ravine — and that's the point. Dirt singletrack along Secret Ravine creek, oak woodland, occasional deer. The "wild" version of a Roseville walk.

SECTION TWO

Family & Kids

Indoor, outdoor, educational, and refreshingly free.

13 Maidu Museum & Historic Site

FREE · PETROGLYPHS ON-SITE · 1970 JOHNSON RANCH DR

One of Roseville's most underrated free attractions. Open-air petroglyph trail (genuinely thousands of years old) plus an indoor museum on Nisenan Maidu history. Kids do well here because there's a short outdoor walk plus hands-on indoor exhibits. Plan 60–90 minutes.

14 Roseville Utility Exploration Center

FREE · INTERACTIVE EXHIBITS · BEST FOR AGES 4–12

Hands-down the best free indoor activity in town for kids. Interactive exhibits on water conservation, renewable energy, and electricity — kids think they're playing, they're actually learning. Plan an hour. Often hosts free family events.

15 Roseville Telephone Museum

FREE · 106 VERNON ST · DOWNTOWN

The quirkiest free museum in Roseville. One of the most extensive antique phone collections in the country, run by current and retired phone-company employees who love telling the stories. Kids get to play with switchboards and rotary phones. Surprisingly fascinating for adults.

16 Roseville Public Library — Storytime

FREE · ALL LOCATIONS · WEEKLY

Storytime at Riley, Maidu, and Downtown libraries runs throughout the year and changes themes regularly. The libraries also host seasonal reading challenges, teen blackout-poetry events, "Create!" craft sessions, and the underrated Sensory-Friendly Museum Day for kids who need it.

INSIDER TIP The library system's full calendar at roseville.ca.us/residents/kids is the single best resource for free kids' activities in town. Bookmark it.

17 Carnegie Library Historical Museum

FREE · DOWNTOWN · LOCAL HISTORY

Inside the original 1912 Carnegie library building. Small but engaging exhibits on Roseville's railroad-town origins. The building itself is worth visiting. Pair with the Telephone Museum and a downtown walk.

18 Blue Line Arts Gallery

FREE · DOWNTOWN · ROTATING EXHIBITS

Roseville's contemporary art gallery. Free to wander, rotating local artists, occasional free opening receptions with snacks. Small enough that you can do it in 20 minutes — perfect "kill time before dinner downtown" stop.

19 Fountains at Roseville Splash Pad

FREE · MEMORIAL DAY TO LABOR DAY · BRING TOWELS

The interactive water-jet area at the Fountains shopping center. Open in summer, free to use, kids love it. Plant yourself at one of the patio tables nearby, grab coffee, and let them tire themselves out.

20 Roseville Aquatics Complex — Public Swim

\$5–\$8 · SUMMER · 3051 WOODCREEK OAKS BLVD

An Olympic-sized competition pool with public swim hours all summer. Often less crowded than the Fountains splash pad after 4pm. Great deal for the price.

21 **Adventure Club at City Rec**

LOW COST · DROP-IN PROGRAMS · AFTER-SCHOOL OPTIONS

The City of Roseville's drop-in kids' rec programs run year-round and cost a fraction of private equivalents. Check the latest catalog at roseville.ca.us — programs change quarterly.

22 **Denio's Farmers Market & Swap Meet**

\$1–\$3 ENTRY · FRI/SAT/SUN · AUBURN BLVD

Just over the Roseville line in Roseville/Citrus Heights, Denio's is a sprawling weekend swap-meet-meets-farmers-market. Treasure-hunt for kids, cheap produce, \$2 tacos. A genuine taste of how the region looked 40 years ago.

SECTION THREE

Eats & Treats Under \$15

The local-only spots tourists never find — most are in strip malls.

23 Nixtaco

TACOS \$5–8 · UNASSUMING STRIP MALL · WORTH THE WAIT

The best taco in the Sacramento region, and it's in Roseville. Named for nixtamalization — the ancient process of treating corn — the tortillas alone are worth the trip. Duck carnitas, octopus, steak and bone marrow. Real chefs, no pretense, perfect execution. Always a line at lunch and dinner.

INSIDER TIP Go between 2:30 and 4pm to skip the line. Order the duck carnitas. Bring cash for the propina jar.

24 The Place

PASTA \$14–16 · FAMILY-OWNED 40+ YEARS · GENERATIONS OF REGULARS

Three generations of Roseville families have come here for the lasagna, hand-rolled gnocchi, and "beast bread." Thin-crust pizzas with house-made sausage. Red-checkered tablecloths. The opposite of trendy fusion. Order the lasagna and the beast bread and don't overthink it.

25 Old Town Pizza

SLICES \$4–6 · DOWNTOWN · VERNON STREET

Downtown's reliable slice shop. Big slices, generous toppings, real-people prices. The spot for a quick bite before walking around downtown or hitting Vernon Street Town Square on a Tuesday night.

26 Roundhouse Deli

SANDWICHES \$9–12 · DOWNTOWN · CLOSSES EARLY

The downtown sandwich shop everyone loves and few people from outside Roseville have heard of. Big portions, friendly counter staff, walkable to Vernon Square. A standing lunch order for downtown workers.

27 Tokyo Ice Cream

\$5-8 PER SCOOP · JAPANESE STYLE · MOCHI, TAIYAKI

Mochi ice cream, taiyaki (fish-shaped pastries filled with ice cream), Japanese-style flavors done well. Open late on weekends. Great post-dinner-downtown stop.

28 Mahany Park Sunday Farmers Market

FREE ENTRY · 9AM-1PM SUNDAYS · YEAR-ROUND

The local favorite. Year-round, rain or shine, with ethnic food vendors, fresh produce, baked goods, and live music. Widely considered the best farmers market in the region. Stroll the park before or after.

29 Whole Foods Tuesday Market

FREE ENTRY · 8:30AM-1PM TUESDAYS · GALLERIA BLVD

Different vibe from Mahany. Lunchtime crowd, busy shopping-center energy, broader produce selection. Quick stop on a weekday for fresh produce or flowers.

SECTION FOUR

Free Events & Community

The recurring stuff worth putting on your calendar now.

30 Downtown Tuesday Nights

FREE · TUESDAYS IN JUNE & JULY · 5PM–9PM · VERNON SQUARE

The single best weekly event in Roseville. Every Tuesday in June and July (except July 4), Vernon Street shuts down for a free street fair: classic car show, live bands, food trucks, kids' zone, local vendor booths. Pure summer-evening Americana. Bring lawn chairs if you want to plant for the music.

INSIDER TIP Park in the Vernon Street Parking Garage next to Blue Line Arts — use the Oak Street entrance. It fills by 6pm. Get there by 5:30.

31 Springtime in the Square

FREE ENTRY · MID-MAY · SUNDAY · VERNON SQUARE

Spring festival with 100+ vendors, food trucks, live music, and a paid kids' zone. The unofficial kickoff to outdoor festival season in Roseville. Free admission, pre-buy kids zone tickets online if you're going with little ones.

32 June Fest Jamboree

FREE · MID-JUNE · MAIDU COMMUNITY PARK

A summer-kickoff festival at Maidu Park with live music, food trucks, and family activities. Less downtown-busy than the Vernon Square events. Great for families who want a calmer crowd.

33 Summer Family Fun Fest

FREE · MID-JULY · VERNON SQUARE · 10AM–3PM

100+ vendors, two live bands, food trucks, free kids' crafts, kids' zone activities. Easily worth a Sunday afternoon if you're in town.

34 **Falling Leaf Festival**

FREE · MID-OCTOBER · VERNON SQUARE · 10AM–3PM

The fall version of Springtime in the Square. Pumpkin painting, a pumpkin carving contest, dessert contest, kids' games, live music, and 100+ makers. Best with a hot cider in hand and a sweater.

35 **Improv Playground**

FREE FIRST TIME · TUESDAYS 6–8PM · HOLISTIC LIGHT HOUSE

An open, friendly improv group at the Holistic Light House (Vernon Square area). First visit is free. Run by The Improv Impact — emphasis on joy, not perfection. Two hours of laughs.

36 **Big Boy Bash & Makers on the Rail**

FREE · EARLY APRIL · VERNON SQUARE · TIED TO BIG BOY STEAM TRAIN TOUR

When the Union Pacific Big Boy steam train tours through Roseville (every few years), the town throws a Big Boy Bash: live music, lawn games, inflatable kids' zone, food trucks, and 100+ makers. Easily the most photogenic event of the year. Check the date — it's not annual.

37 **Vernon Town Square First-Saturday Farmers Market**

FREE · FIRST SATURDAY MONTHLY · 311 VERNON ST

Run by Cross Roads NPO (a nonprofit helping foster kids develop workplace skills). Local vendors, produce, crafts, jewelry, food trucks, occasional live music. Smaller and more intimate than the festivals.

SECTION FIVE

Day Trips Within an Hour

Northern California's hidden gems are closer than you think.

38 Old Town Auburn

30 MIN AWAY · GOLD-RUSH HISTORY · ANTIQUE SHOPS

Roseville's nearest gold-country town. Boutique shops, the Old Town Firehouse, the Bernhard Museum, Gold Rush Museum, and a half-dozen restaurants in old stone buildings. Spend the morning wandering, eat lunch, drive home — perfect three-hour escape.

39 Hidden Falls Regional Park

\$5 WEEKDAY PARKING · WEEKEND RESERVATIONS REQUIRED · 45 MIN AWAY

1,200 acres, 30 miles of trails, two observation decks over a 30-foot waterfall. The closest "real" waterfall to Roseville. Family-friendly main loop, plus harder loops if you want a workout. Pair with lunch at Auburn Alehouse on the way home.

INSIDER TIP Weekend parking requires a reservation booked in advance at placer.ca.gov/hiddenfalls. Go on a weekday and skip the system entirely. Spring is greenest.

40 Foresthill Bridge

FREE · 50 MIN AWAY · 5TH TALLEST BRIDGE IN THE U.S.

You can drive across it. You can walk it. You can stand at the middle and watch the American River 730 feet below. There's a paid releases-from-the-dam waterfall spectacle nearby — check schedules. Pair with the No Hands Bridge trail in the Auburn State Recreation Area.

41 **Historic Folsom + Folsom Zoo Sanctuary**

25 MIN AWAY · ANTIQUE SHOPS + RESCUED WILDLIFE SANCTUARY

Folsom's old town district has antique shops, restaurants, and the Folsom History Museum. The Folsom City Zoo is actually a sanctuary for rescued wild animals — different from a traditional zoo. A small steam train circles the grounds. Perfect for kids who love both trains and animals.

42 **South Yuba River State Park**

\$10 ENTRY · 1 HR AWAY · SWIMMING HOLES, COVERED BRIDGE

Famous for its swimming holes and the longest single-span wooden covered bridge in the U.S. Hot summer day? This is where locals go to actually cool off. Brisk Sierra water, oak woodlands, easy trails.

43 **Empire Mine State Park**

\$7 ENTRY · 1 HR AWAY · GRASS VALLEY · HISTORIC MINE + ESTATE

One of California's oldest, largest, and deepest hard-rock gold mines. Tour the mine entrance, walk the gardens of the owner's mansion, hike the surrounding 14 miles of trails. Surprisingly underrated.

44 **Donner Lake / Truckee**

1.5 HR AWAY · BEACH, SWIM, KAYAK, HISTORY

If Lake Tahoe is too crowded (and on summer weekends it is), Donner Lake is its quieter, cheaper cousin. Swimming, kayaking, beach picnics, plus the Donner Party history at the state park. Stop in Truckee for dinner on the drive home.

45 Griffith Quarry Park — Penryn

FREE · 20 MIN AWAY · HISTORIC QUARRY · SHADED PICNIC AREA

One of the most overlooked spots in Placer County. This small park in Penryn sits on the grounds of a 19th-century granite quarry that supplied stone for buildings across California — including the San Francisco Mint. There's a restored quarry building, shaded picnic areas, a small pond, and interpretive signs that tell the full story. Calm, uncrowded, and genuinely interesting. Most Roseville residents have never been despite it being 20 minutes away.

INSIDER TIP Pair it with a stop at one of the Penryn-area fruit stands if you're going in summer or fall. The drive through Penryn itself is one of the nicer short rural drives in Placer County.

Local Secrets

The stuff only people who've lived here a while know.

46 The Solo Tree (#thatrosevillesolotree)

FREE · PHOTOGRAPHY SPOT · PRIVATE PROPERTY — BE RESPECTFUL

The lone oak tree on the west edge of Roseville that's become an Instagram landmark. Search the hashtag and you'll see why. Drive west until houses thin out and rolling grass takes over.

IMPORTANT The tree is on private property. Photograph from the public road. Don't trespass. Locals who do this respectfully keep the spot open for everyone.

47 Maidu Grinding Stones

FREE · MAIDU PARK · EASY TO MISS

Centuries-old grinding stones — bedrock depressions worn smooth by generations of Nisenan Maidu women processing acorns — sit right along the Maidu Park trail. Most visitors walk right past. Look for the interpretive panels near the museum.

48 Sunrise at Beal's Point

FREE BEFORE PARK OPENS · FOLSOM LAKE

The walk-in entrance opens before the vehicle gate. If you park outside and walk in at sunrise, you'll get the lake almost entirely to yourself — fog on the water, deer at the shore, zero people. Roseville's most underrated 20-minute experience.

49 The PFE Footbridge

FREE · DOWNTOWN · HISTORIC RAILROAD CROSSING

An old Pacific Fruit Express footbridge crossing the rail yards near downtown. A reminder that Roseville was built on the railroad — and you can stand right above it. Best for photos at golden hour.

50 The "Free Parking" Move Downtown

FREE · VERNON STREET AREA

The Vernon Street Parking Garage (Oak Street entrance) is free for the first two hours. Most events run 5–9pm; if you arrive after 7pm and only stay 2 hours, you pay nothing. The garage is right next to Blue Line Arts and walkable to everything downtown.

BONUS

Seasonal Calendar

When the best free stuff actually happens, month by month.

JANUARY **Quiet month.** Best for library events, museums, and indoor activities. Walking and biking are enjoyable if you tolerate fog.

FEBRUARY **Almond blossom season** begins in the surrounding valleys. Drive west out of town for the pink-and-white groves.

MARCH **Wildflowers** kick off at Hidden Falls. **Miner's Ravine** is at its greenest. Library spring reading challenges start.

APRIL Possible **Big Boy Bash** if the steam train tours. Trails are peak green — best month for a Hidden Falls visit.

MAY **Springtime in the Square** festival. Folsom Lake fills back up. Last comfortable month to do midday outdoor activities before heat.

JUNE **Downtown Tuesday Nights** begin. **June Fest Jamboree** at Maidu. Lake swimming season opens.

JULY **Downtown Tuesday Nights** continue (skip July 4). **Summer Family Fun Fest** mid-month. South Yuba River is in full swing. Get outdoor activities done before 10am.

AUGUST Hottest month. Indoor museums, splash pad, library, and Folsom Lake before 9am. Donner Lake is a smart escape.

SEPTEMBER Temperatures break. Outdoor activities return to comfortable. **Hidden Falls** uncrowded again. Patio season returns.

OCTOBER **Falling Leaf Festival.** Old Town Auburn is at its best — gold-rush vibes plus actual fall color. Pumpkin patches open in surrounding farmland.

NOVEMBER Crisp walking and biking weather. Holiday markets begin. Mahany Sunday market is at peak produce.

DECEMBER

Vernon Street holiday lights. Downtown Roseville goes full small-town-Christmas. Free to walk through.

Local Pro Tips

Things you only learn the long way.

Park free at Vernon Garage, Oak Street entrance.

Two hours free. The most underused parking move in town. Most people park on the street and pay, or park at the more obvious Lincoln Street side. Oak Street is right next to Blue Line Arts and just as close to everything.

Folsom Lake fills by 10:30 on summer weekends.

Be there by 9, or come after 4pm when day-trippers leave. The Roseville Public Library loans out free California State Park day passes — check with any branch before you pay a day-use fee. The annual pass (\$125) also pays back after four visits if you go often.

Hidden Falls weekend = reservation required.

Book at placer.ca.gov/hiddenfalls before you drive 45 minutes out there. Or just go on a weekday and skip the system. Weekdays are also less crowded on the trails.

The Maidu Library calendar is the secret weapon for parents.

Free kids' programming, sensory-friendly events, teen workshops, science nights — they run constantly and almost nothing is publicized outside the library system. Bookmark roseville.ca.us/residents/kids.

Nixtaco's late-lunch window beats the crush.

2:30–4pm. Walk right in. Order the duck carnitas. Bring cash for the tip jar.

Always check the Roseville Weekend newsletter Friday morning.
